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Top masters picks

The second major of the PGA Tour season is about to kick off with the 2025 PGA Championship taking place on May 15th at Quail Hollow Club in Charlotte. The tournament boasts a star-studded lineup, with Xander Schauffele aiming to defend his title and boasting +1200 odds. Scottie Scheffler and Rory McIlroy are joint favorites at +500, while other top contenders include Bryson DeChambeau (+1000), Ludvig Åberg (+1200), Collin Morikawa (+1400), and Jon Rahm (+1800). The purse for this year's championship is expected to exceed the 2024 figure of \$18.5 million. In related news, golf enthusiasts are eagerly anticipating the One and Done format, which allows players to pick one golfer per week and earn points based on their chosen player's prize money. This format has gained popularity due to its similarities with NFL Survivor pools. Jordan Spieth is looking to become just the seventh golfer to complete a career grand slam by winning at the PGA Championship 2025. For those seeking expert advice, SportsLine DFS pro and PGA specialist Mike McClure has some crucial insights. McClure's proprietary simulation model has been impressively accurate in predicting golf picks, with nearly \$9,000 in winnings since June 2020. His top One and Done pick at the Genesis Invitational was Ludvig Åberg, who went on to win outright and collect \$3.6 million. McClure is now focusing on the 2025 PGA Championship and has revealed his optimal One and Done picks. One of his top recommendations is Bryson DeChambeau (+1000), the reigning U.S. Open champion with an impressive track record in major championships. Additionally, McClure suggests targeting another golfer at a longshot price of 40-1 in the latest PGA Championship odds. Picks like these could make all the difference for players looking to gain an edge in their One and Done pool. Before making any selections, it's essential to consider McClure's expert advice and see his recommended picks for the 2025 PGA Championship. Rory McIlroy is all business when it comes to clinching titles, as he showed at the Masters where he won without talking to Bryson DeChambeau during the final round. This approach has led to some people questioning their relationship, but both golfers have downplayed any tension. McIlroy emphasized that his focus was on himself and what he needed to do to win, dismissing claims of a rift between them. In fact, DeChambeau even stated that McIlroy's silence wasn't meant as a slight and that they're not at odds. Now, McIlroy is looking forward to the PGA Championship at Quail Hollow, where he'll be aiming to add another title to his collection. He's eager to enjoy this moment and play his best golf without feeling burdened by statistics or numbers. The tension between these two golfing greats has added an interesting layer to their relationship, but it seems they're both on the same page when it comes to their focus on winning. His odds of +8000 seem favorable to bettors. Tiger Woods, despite his age and injury issues, still offers intriguing odds at +12000. While it's hard to fathom him winning again after 2019, he'd become the oldest golfer in history to win The Masters if he did it this year. For those looking for a more relaxed betting experience, Underdog Fantasy allows customers to pick Higher or Lower and string together multiple selections into one entry, similar to a parlay at a sportsbook. Fans can now see specific tips and picks for each market that the GolfBet team will be focusing on every week. The traditional format of lineups and rosters remains, with experts competing to top the PGA TOUR Fantasy Golf charts. Each week, the experts from PGATOUR.COM make their selections in PGA TOUR Fantasy Golf. A lineup consists of four starters and two bench players who can be rotated after each round. An added challenge is that every golfer can only be used three times per segment. Aside from the experts' picks, GolfBet Insider Rob Bolton breaks down the field at the Masters Tournament in this week's edition of Power Rankings. Will Gray (Lead, Fantasy & Betting) suggests Scottie Scheffler (+400) as a winner, noting his strong performance heading into his 2022 Masters triumph and current form. Top contenders include Ludvig Åberg (+225), who led the Valero field in SG: Tee-to-Green last week, and Russell Henley (+6000), a former Georgia Bulldog with recent top-5 finishes. Ben Everill (Senior writer, Fantasy & Betting) recommends Xander Schauffele (+1600) as a winner, citing his past success and readiness to contend. Other top contenders include Sahith Theegala (+320) and Jason Day +6600, who offer value in the right situations. Looking at the odds for this week's tournament, it seems like many have written off some big names. Zalatoris, who has had a strong career and was once considered one of my top picks, now has +4000 odds. Meanwhile, guys like Shane Lowry and Collin Morikawa are favored to win at -110. On the other hand, I'm taking Scottie Scheffler at +400, as I think he's the best player on paper. His form is solid, and he has a good track record at Augusta. Some people might be sleeping on Matt Fitzpatrick, who had a great weekend in San Antonio and still has a lot of golf left in him. As for longshots, Max Homa seems like an interesting pick, given his talent and star power. Looking ahead to the head-to-head matchups, I think Shane Lowry has a good chance against Collin Morikawa, as Lowry's form is looking better than Morikawa's recent struggles with his iron play. Looking ahead to the upcoming PGA Championship, several expert picks stand out for your pool. One player in particular has caught Brett Jungles' eye: Rory McIlroy. According to the Official World Golf Ranking's Top 50, McIlroy is the top pick from Tier 1. His impressive record at Quail Hollow Club in Charlotte is hard to ignore. Having won four times in 13 events, McIlroy boasts a batting average above .300 at this venue. Furthermore, he has finished T10 or better in five of his other nine starts. Additionally, McIlroy is in top form, having won three times in nine starts this season, including the Masters Tournament. His excellent drive accuracy and consistency off the tee make him an attractive pick. He leads the PGA Tour in strokes gained from the tee box and ranks second in true strokes gained off the tee. In contrast to other players at Quail Hollow, McIlroy's ability to crush drives rewards him with a strong performance. This is a key factor to consider when selecting your player for the PGA Championship pool. Tier 3 golfers Min Woo Lee and Daniel Berger were repeat picks from the Masters pool, but Lee's long-distance driving skills took precedence due to his fourth-place ranking in average driving distance this season (316.1). While Berger is improving overall, he relies on accuracy rather than raw power. In Tier 4, Andrew Novak's consistent form caught the eye, with a strong finish at the Trusti Championship despite a worst result over the last month coming from his most recent tournament. He ranked seventh in total true strokes gained since April and demonstrated a solid putting performance at the Bermuda Championship. Mackenzie Hughes, a Tier 5 golfer, doesn't fit the typical power-hitter profile but is playing some impressive golf lately. With a strong finish at the ONEflight Myrtle Beach Classic and a previous top-10 result at Quail Hollow in the Wells Fargo Championship, he's a viable dark horse candidate. Wild card Keith Mitchell has been on fire, finishing no worse than 20th since March's Valspar Championship. His scorching hot starts have earned him more total true strokes gained on opening days than any other player except World No. 1 Scottie Scheffler, according to datagolf.com data.
