Guess the note, then use the tuning fork to see if you're right. Practice as often as you can by choosing your favorite songs and trying to identify the "tonic note" of the piece, which you will sing as Do, then sing the entire song in solfège. Knowing these can help you sight-sing a note in the sheet music that's a half step up or down from the scale you are singing in. This is the note usually used as the baseline note for singers. You may have heard singers sing ascending scales like this: Do Re Mi Fa Sol La Ti Do. (If you haven't, check out this example to learn the intervals between notes: . 2 Identify the key. Many vocalists sing by ear and never find the need to learn to sight-read, but session singers and classical singers will need to read sheet music on first sight.A competent sight-reader can use their skills to learn songs faster, deputise with any band and gain session work with producers and studios, so it's definitely worth learning.
