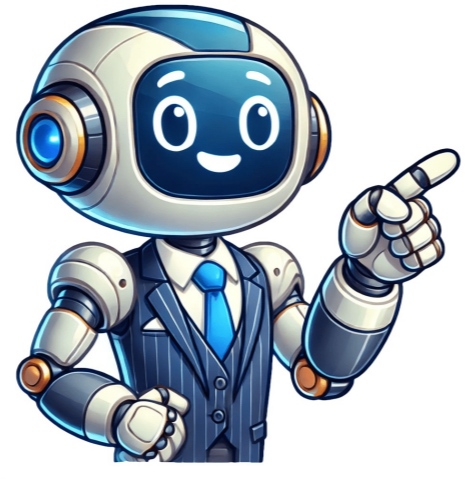

He said that it is due to "a combination of a number of factors."Firstly, he entertained the grim possibility of abduction and trafficking but deemed it improbable given the remote location and harsh winter conditions. "The only way I think she would possibly still be alive is if she had been kidnapped and trafficked," he said.The investigator added: "You know we are talking about Woodsville, New Hampshire, in the middle of February. "I can't believe that all this time would go by and she would not have contacted them somehow," he said.He also highlighted the lack of concrete evidence at the crash site, questioning the absence of footprints in the snow and the failure to uncover any substantial leads despite extensive search efforts.And Barry continued: "The chances of her being voluntarily disappeared are negligible. "I believe that my sister was met with foul play and I believe that she's most likely no longer with us," Julie wet, pointing to the lack of sightings and concrete evidence over the past two decades.She added: "My reasoning behind that is number one there were no footprints in the snow. There was a helicopter search with heat sensing radar technology, there were a ton of people in and around the scene, there were a ton of searches in that immediate area and nothing has ever been found.
