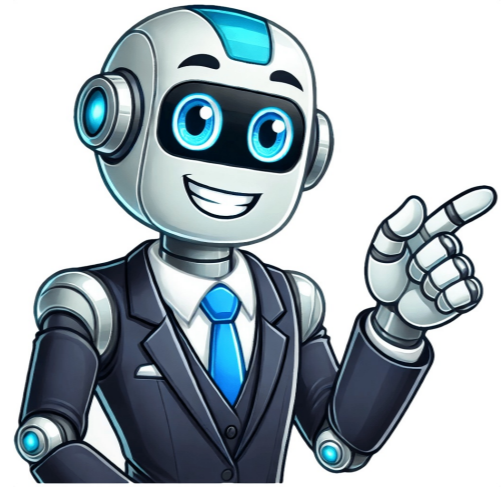

Wr chess masters 2024

WR Chess is a global organization dedicated to promoting chess among children and nurturing emerging talent. Under the leadership of Wadim Rosenstein, WR Chess is passionate about spreading the game and fostering a sense of belonging among players worldwide. The organization's world-class tournaments embody excellence and innovation, setting a new standard for chess competitions that inspire others and push the boundaries of the sport. The WR Chess Masters Cup 2024 attracted widespread attention, with over 70 million views online. This highly anticipated event brought together 16 top chess players in a unique format: a knockout system with two classical games per day. Another successful tournament was the WR Chess Masters, which featured a ten-player round-robin competition and drew massive audiences worldwide, garnering 50 million viewers. The event showcased the world's best chess players and saw Levon Aronian emerge as the champion. The World Rapid Team Championship also took place in Dusseldorf, with WR Chess emerging victorious and securing the team's first world championship title. In a thrilling conclusion to the WR Chess Masters Cup 2024, Arjun Erigaisi secured victory over Maxime Vachier-Lagrave, claiming the title and valuable FIDE Circuit points. The tournament was marked by exceptional performances from top players, including Viswanathan Anand, Veselin Topalov, and Alexandra Kosteniuk. The WR Chess Masters Cup 2024 was notable for its innovative time control, which received praise from organizer Wadim Rosenstein. This forward-thinking approach is set to shape the future of competitive chess, according to Rosenstein. The event also featured live coverage by ChessBase India and commentary by German national coach Jan Gustafsson. Arjun Erigaisi won the WR Chess Masters Cup 2024 by defeating Maxime Vachier-Lagrave in a thrilling Armageddon game. Erigaisi started strong with a victory over Bodhana Sivanandan and then defeated several top players, including Vidit and Praggnanandhaa. He also beat Uzbek grandmaster Javokhir Sindarov before facing Abusattorov in the semi-finals. In the final, Erigaisi and Vachier-Lagrave drew both games before going to an Armageddon tiebreaker. The WR Chess Masters 2024 was covered live by ChessBase India along with German national coach Jan Gustafsson guiding viewers through the game. A new time control format used during the tournament which gave players 60 minutes for first 30 moves, then 30 minutes for next 20 moves and last 30 minutes of the rest of the game. Wadim Rosenstein stated that fast classical time controls are the future in competitive chess. Arjun Erigaisi was undefeated throughout the competition beating Bodhana Sivanandan in his opening game and then winning against several strong opponents including Vidit and Praggnanandhaa. Maxime Vachier-Lagrave defeated Alireza Firouzja in semi-finals before facing Arjun Erigaisi in final. The two players agreed to draw in first game, but second game was wild with both players attacking each other. In decisive armageddon, Erigaisi started with 6 minutes and 38 seconds on clock against Vachier-Lagrave, who had black pieces and the certainty of a draw to win tournament. Despite time disadvantage, Arjun kept his nerve and skillfully took advantage of Vachier-Lagrave's mistakes. However, it was not complete success for Erigaisi as he fell short of breaking 2800 Elo barrier. Arjun Erigaisi Wins WR Chess Masters 2024 GM Arjun Erigaisi has emerged as the champion of WR Chess Masters 2024, held in London. This strong 16-player knockout tournament saw Arjun remain unbeaten throughout, ultimately defeating Maxime Vachier-Lagrave in the finals. The highly anticipated Championship Game between Maxime Vachier Lagrave and Arjun Erigaisi lived up to its expectations. The match began with the Petroff Defense, where both players engaged in an early exchange of knights and pawns. Although the position seemed slightly imbalanced, it remained under the control of both players. As the game progressed, White's 20.Ng5 targeted the Black king by sacrificing his knight on f7. When Black captured the knight with their rook, White pinned the rook with 22.Be6. The game then swung in favor of Black with winning chances. The position fluctuated between equal and slightly better for Black in the middle game. Arjun made precise moves under serious time pressure while Maxime carefully planned attacks with more time on the clock. After the queen exchange, the game transitioned into a rook vs bishop and knight endgame, where Black was slightly better. Maxime landed in time trouble at this point, making it difficult for him to find the right moves. A terrible blunder occurred when Maxime played 68.Kf3, allowing Black to push their b-pawn and fork White's rook with a check. This put Black in a winning position, leading to Maxime's resignation after the 69th move. Arjun's victory marked an incredible fight between two world-class players. With this win, Arjun will now participate in the European Club Cup, which begins on October 20. It will be interesting to see how he performs after having only a two-day gap. **Chess Match Results** On October 14 and 15, several chess matches were played as part of an event. Here are the results: **Day 1 (Oct 14)** * Maghsoodloo beat Sadhwani in the Nimzo-Indian variation. * Vachier Lagrave drew with Sindarov in a Queen's Gambit Declined game. * Topalov lost to Vidit in a Ruy Lopez match. * Erigaisi Arjun defeated Sivanandan in another Ruy Lopez game. * Kosteniuk was beaten by Abusattorov in the Robatsch (modern) defence. * Firouzja drew with Vaishali in the same opening. * Anand lost to Royal in a King's pawn game. * Bologan was defeated by Praggnanandhaa R. in a Queen's Gambit Declined Slav match. * Sadhwani won against Maghsoodloo in Philidor's defence. **Day 2 (Oct 15)** * Vidit beat Topalov in the Gruenfeld, exchange variation. * Kosteniuk drew with Abusattorov in a Queen's Gambit Declined Slav game. * Sindarov was beaten by Vachier Lagrave in the Scotch game. * Vidit and Erigaisi Arjun drew in a Sicilian Najdorf match. **Day 3 (Oct 16)** * Vachier Lagrave and Firouzja drew in the Ruy Lopez. * Praggnanandhaa R. and Erigaisi Arjun drew in the Sicilian defence. * Firouzja and Vachier Lagrave drew in the King's Indian defence. **Day 4 (Oct 17)** * Erigaisi Arjun and Vachier Lagrave drew in a French defence match. * Vachier Lagrave lost to Erigaisi Arjun in another Sicilian Najdorf game. * The event is not specified, but it appears to be a chess tournament with multiple matches played over several days.
