Sahej Paath (also known as Sadharan Paath or Khula Paath) is a type of Sikh scripture reading that can be done at any time and with any number of participants. It involves slowly reciting the entire Guru Granth Sahib, which consists of 1430 pages, over several days or even months. This type of reading is considered "easy" or "simple" because it allows readers to complete the task at their own pace and schedule. The Paath can be done by one person or a group, and its completion can be a meaningful way to connect with the Guru and celebrate special occasions. Khula Path and Sahej Paath in Sikh Tradition The Guru Granth Sahib is considered a sacred text by Sikhs, and establishing a close relationship with the Guru through its study is crucial. Sehaj paath apps have emerged to facilitate convenient access to this practice. Sehaj paath allows individuals to engage with the Guru's teachings independently, typically starting with the first few Paaths for beginners. This practice concludes with a bhog ceremony and may be accompanied by Khula Paths during Antam Sankar ceremonies, which are Sikh last rites. In some Sikh households, a reading of Guru Granth Sahib (Khulla path) is organized on designated days, often followed by Sukhmani Sahib or shabad kirtan. Thirteen days after the passing, a final puja and reading of Guru Granth Sahib are performed to help release the soul from worldly bonds. The Sikh tradition emphasizes the importance of maintaining a separate space for the Guru Granth Sahib in one's home, learning Gurmukhi, and incorporating its teachings into daily life. The goal is to complete a full reading of the Guru Granth within a specified timeframe, often accompanied by recitation of Anand Sahib and performance of Ardas. Sehaj Path is a type of recitation that involves slowly reading Guru Granth Sahib, often taking several months. This method is also known as slow reading and is characterized by interrupting the reading process in intervals over time. Unlike Akhand Paath, which is typically completed within three days, Sehaj Path can take longer to complete.
