According to a study by the Foreign Service Institute (FSI), "super-hard" languages like Chinese require approximately 2,200 learning hours to achieve general professional proficiency. This timeframe can be divided differently based on your individual learning schedule. For example, studying five hours daily for five days a week will take around 88 weeks or one and a half to two years. The Hanyu Shuiping Kaoshi (HSK) is another benchmark; it's the standard proficiency test for Mandarin Chinese, with level 5 representing the ability to comfortably read magazines and watch movies. Most students who study full-time at a university in China can pass the HSK 5 within one to two years. However, when considering varying amounts of formal classes, independent study, and time spent living or travelling in China, it's common for people to take around three to five years to become proficient in Chinese. Remember that everyone's learning journey is unique, and predicting a timeframe based solely on hours spent isn't as meaningful as focusing on the quality of your learning. The good news is that you're in control of your own learning, making every experience valuable. Achieving fluency in Chinese typically requires consistent study over two to four years, with around 2,200 hours of dedication for English speakers to reach proficiency.
