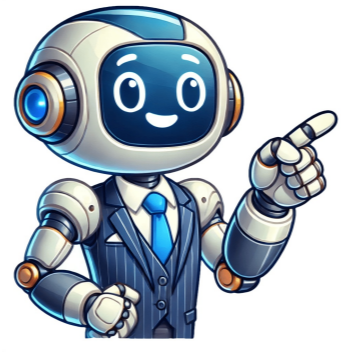


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You can use a stool sample to identify certain health issues or diagnose medical conditions, including cancer. Most people collect the sample themselves at home. The FIT (Faecal Immunochemical Test) checks for blood in your stool and can spot tiny amounts that you might not be able to see. However, having blood in your stool doesn't necessarily mean you have cancer - it could also be a sign of another condition. The test looks specifically for human blood and is less likely to detect other types of blood that might come from food. If you're experiencing symptoms that could be linked to bowel cancer, your doctor may ask you to do the FIT test as part of an investigation. The results can help your doctor decide whether to refer you for further tests. If your doctor has asked you to do a FIT test, they'll usually provide you with the testing kit and instructions on how to use it at home. You only need to collect one sample of stool and put it in the container provided. After that, dip the stick into the sample, make sure the end is covered with stool, and then seal the tube. Once you've completed the test, your doctor will let you know what to do next with the sample. Depending on the results, you may need to undergo further tests or see a specialist. The FIT results can take 1-2 weeks to come back, but if you haven't heard anything after a couple of weeks, contact your doctor for an update. Keep in mind that having blood in your stool is not always a cause for concern and could be related to other health issues. No blood detected in stool test means no cancer likely for most people. However, a normal test result doesn't rule out cancer entirely. If symptoms persist, change, or worsen, consult your GP even with normal results. Some individuals may require further testing. You'll receive the test results via letter within 14 days after submitting your sample. If everything is okay, you won't need to take the test again for 2 years. If blood is present in your stool, hospital tests might be necessary. A nurse will contact you regarding your result and any additional testing required.
